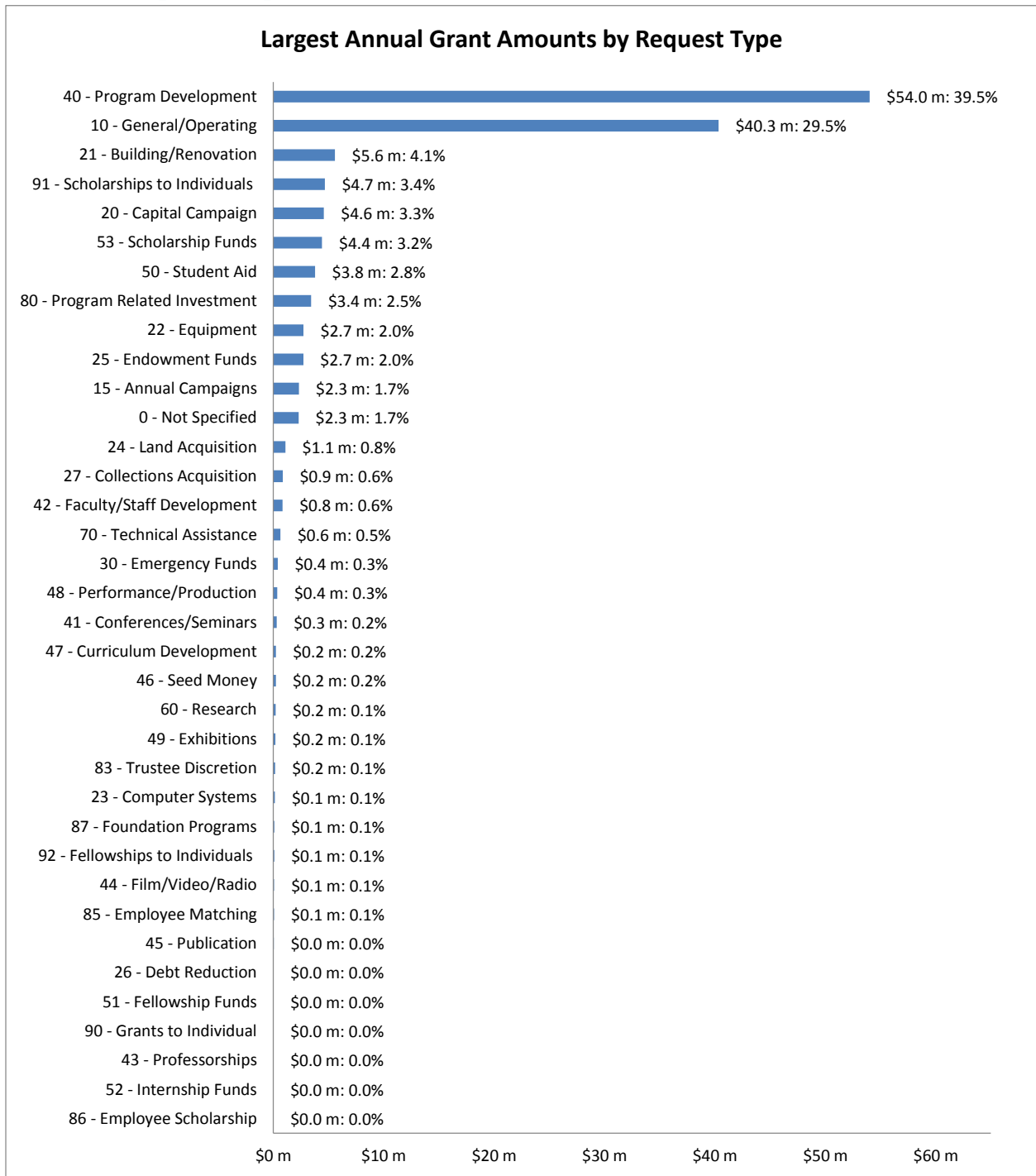

Grants – Field of Interest Break Down



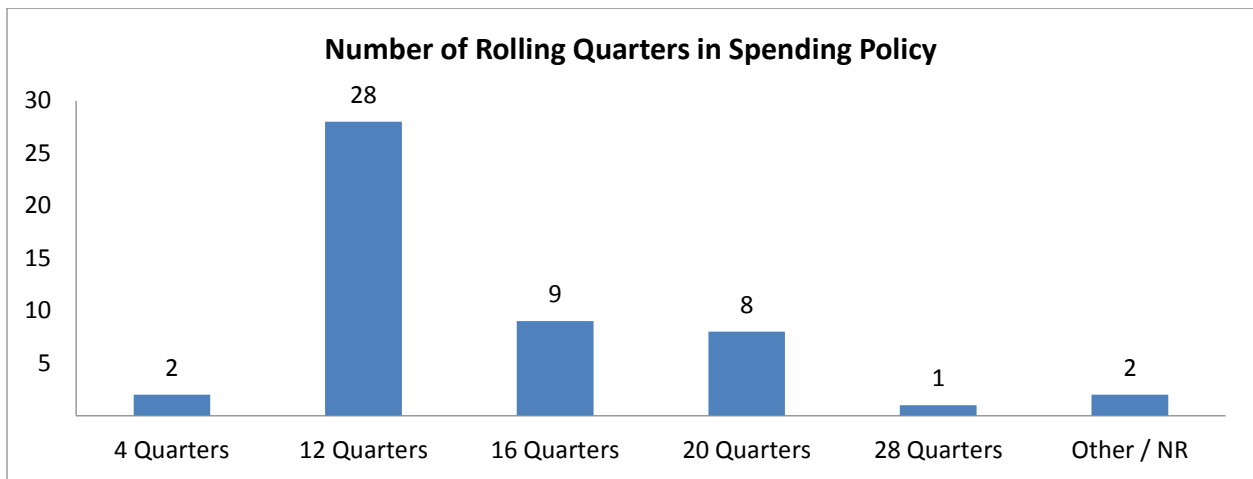
Grants - Request Type Breakdown

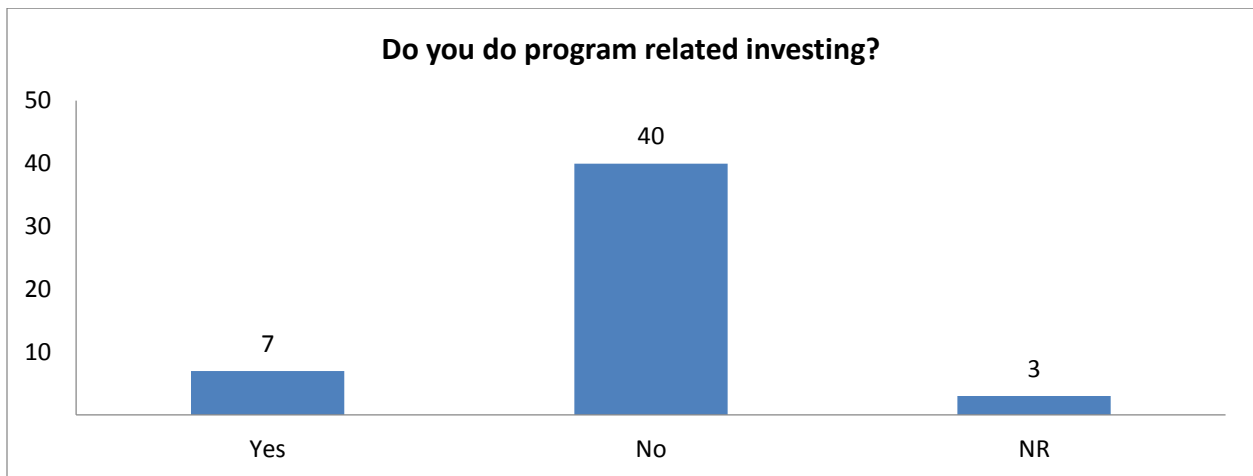

Allegan County Community Foundation	Spotting or anticipating problems and acting to prevent them - Keep Your ArtsAlive! was created in response to the impact of reduced funding for the non-profit arts and cultural organizations that entertain, enlighten and educate those in and around Allegan County. Community members, tourists and those who appreciate the rich array of opportunities here in Allegan County vote for their favorite organizations. Votes cost \$1 each and 100% of the voting dollars go to the organization receiving the votes. In only three years (not including 2013), over \$253,000 has been generated by Keep Your ArtsAlive!

Barry Community Foundation	Leveraging or brokering funds to meet community needs - Revolving loan fund created provided an option for donors to become involved in providing for gap funding that met our mission to build a vibrant economy that attracts a diverse community of employers over the long term by offering high quality of life, sound infrastructure, plentiful resources and reasonable costs.
Battle Creek Community Foundation	Catalyst for needed change.
Bay Area Community Foundation	Involvement in community planning for the future - BACF has partnered with business, government, education, non-profit, and community leaders to complete a strategic plan for Bay County. To date the process has included funding a county report card with assistance of Saginaw Valley State University. We then conducted visioning sessions with community leaders. The results of this work indicated residents want and need a strong sense of place, outstanding workforce talent, the ability to meet basic human needs, and the necessity to grow a diverse economy. In each one of these areas, it is essential for non-profits, for profits, and government leaders to work together to develop and implement collaborative programs and projects. The goal is to move the community forward in three, five, and ten year increments.
Branch County Community Foundation	Involvement in community planning for the future - Our strategy focuses on education. We are partnering with other organizations in our county to focus on planning for the future by offering training, scholarships, and life skills training to the residents of our county.

Canton Community Foundation	Providing technical assistance to nonprofits - Involved in planning/implementation in numerous projects to move growing community forward...parks and theaters, for example. Also, sponsoring a number of pass-through funds which provides technical assistance to other community volunteers .
Capital Region Community Foundation	Convener for community discussions - With the nonprofit and philanthropic sectors increasing their focus on Collective Impact, CRCF has taken the opportunity to convene a variety of audiences to educate the community and explore new opportunities. General "orientation" sessions have been held for nonprofits and local funders, and targeted conversations designed to align local agencies around college access and educational achievement have been well-received. CRCF has also assisted in creating strategic partnerships that augment the convening role for a variety of sub-sector initiatives (health, housing, refugee services). Finally, CRCF has embraced the opportunity to convene local donors and nonprofit thought leaders to share innovations in partnership, advancements toward collective impact, and opportunities for more strategic philanthropy.
Charlevoix County Community Foundation	Developing community leaders - The Charlevoix County Community Foundation continued to provide financial support to "Leadership Charlevoix County," (LCC) a county-wide leadership development program. In addition to financial support, the Foundation also sites on the LCC Steering Committee.
Chippewa County Community Foundation	Leveraging or brokering funds to meet community needs - The Chippewa County Community Foundation supports and administers 65 funds for our community .
Community Foundation for Muskegon County	Catalyst for needed change - By leveraging internal and community resources to bring needed funds to the community and convening discussions to target our grantmaking and development.
Community Foundation for Northeast Michigan	Leveraging or brokering funds to meet community needs - We have been involved in coalitions for homelessness, environmental education, and college access and have leveraged more than \$500,000 for these important issues.
Community Foundation for Southeast Michigan	Stimulating public/private partnership - Through the Foundation's New Economy Initiative, several grants were made that will spur private investment into new businesses in the region that are helping us to move to an innovation-based economy. Also, the Foundation's GreenWays Initiative continues to leverage significant federal dollars into the region.

Community Foundation of Greater Flint	<p>Leveraging or brokering funds to meet community needs - CFGF provided funding to Metro Community Development, Inc. which helped the organization to leverage federal investment through a Building Neighborhood Capacity Program grant. The funding will support comprehensive neighborhood redevelopment efforts in Wards 1 and 3 in the city of Flint. Also, neighborhood inventory data collected by the Neighborhood Small Grants Program grantees became the basis for a grant proposal which brought in over \$3 million for blight elimination in the city of Flint.</p>
Community Foundation of Monroe County	<p>Involvement in community planning for the future - Actively involved in MCAN - Michigan College Access Network. Bringing together community leaders and businesses to partner on this initiative.</p>
Community Foundation of St. Clair County	<p>Stimulating public/private partnership - The Community Foundation has seen tremendous success in 2012 on the development of the Blue Water River Walk, one of the most ambitious projects in its history that will result in the community legacy of public access in perpetuity to a naturalized shoreline and a multi-purpose pedestrian trail. What was initially expected to be about an eight year development, the Community Foundation was able to stimulate public and private collaborative partnerships and bring together the financial resources from numerous sources that will enable the anticipated completion of most the River Walk development through 2013-2014, two to three years after receiving the related gift of 4033 feet of shoreline along St. Clair River. The individual components coming to fruition include: • the complete shoreline & habitat restoration of the made possible through both a \$2 million grant from the NOAA Great Lakes Restoration Program, and a \$250,000 grant from U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service; • the restoration of the old railroad ferry dock in 2013 through private donations that will feature a gathering place for watching birds or freighters, fishing, picnicking, or just enjoying the sights; • the creation of a multi-purpose pedestrian trail in 2013 through the support of MDOT and the St. Clair County Road Commission and generosity of our donors; • St. Clair County Parks & Recreation is in process of acquiring about 3 acres of adjacent land to develop a wetlands park; • a new “Rotary Park” will be built in conjunction with an outdoor classroom area through the committed support of the Port Huron Rotary; and • as the project progresses, additional support from our donors and partners will make possible key trail enhancements and amenities, such as public art, picnic tables, benches, lighting, and historically accurate artifacts and remnants excavated from this site.</p>
Community Foundation of the Holland/Zeeland Area	<p>Providing technical assistance to nonprofits - The Technical Assistance Fund pilot will offer six invited organizations the opportunity to receive customized technical assistance from the Johnson Center for Philanthropy that is specifically fitted to their organization’s current needs. Based on the Johnson Center’s experience, frequent areas of assistance include fundraising, governance, strategic planning, volunteer management, succession planning, and human resources. Each organization will receive approximately 25-30 hours of technical assistance.</p>

Community Foundation of the Upper Peninsula	Leveraging or brokering funds to meet community needs - Our affiliate foundations partner with other non-profits and within their local communities to leverage funds for projects to improve the lives of their residents. The U.P. has many rural communities and working collaboratively has enabled them to make a greater local impact.
Four County Community Foundation	Stimulating public/private partnership - The Capac School Back Pack and Food Truck Project is held annually in August. Parties involved are: Four Co. Com Fdn; Com Foundation of St. Clair Co; CSB Bank; Port Huron Hospital Foundation; Eastern MI Food Bank and Capac Community Schools. 4ccf and CSB Bank split the cost of a semi-load of food from the Food Bank for the event. The other partners provide resources for the back packs and school supplies.

Grand Traverse Regional Community Foundation	Leveraging or brokering funds to meet community needs - Our Community Foundation meets this role as a funder, a philanthropic partner, a convener and a connector. Our grantmaking is reflective of community need, and of the needs that our donors wish to support. We are the philanthropic partner on a number of special projects in our region that are working to meet community needs and/or fill community gaps. As the philanthropic partner, we are often home to the charitable fund to which donors give. As a convener and a connector we often are involved in and/or facilitate discussions around community topics, often with the result of leveraging giving.

The Community Foundation continues to bring public, private, and nonprofit partners together to address challenges and opportunities along the cradle to career continuum.

Lapeer County Community Foundation	Involvement in community planning for the future - For the past six years, LCCF has been a convener in collaboration with the Lapeer Development Corporation to clarify and fund initiatives.
Leelanau Township Community Foundation	Convener for community discussions - The Foundation staff and board worked to form a leadership team consisting of the Village, Township, business owners and community members to work with a consultant and design a current economic development strategy.
Lenawee Community Foundation	Serving as a neutral partner, bringing diverse groups together to solve common problems - Key leader in our local college access network, however we do not take the credit, and instead utilize a true collective impact model

Many of these experiences result in the establishment of permanent endowments by these organizations sometime down the road, meaning that the assistance was valuable to the organization and a positive relationship resulted.
Midland Area Community Foundation	Leveraging or brokering funds to meet community needs - We were involved of a few large community projects last year that ultimately required leveraging of funds by other foundations/companies within the community.

Mt. Pleasant Area Community Foundation	Leveraging or brokering funds to meet community needs - The Mt. Pleasant Area Community Foundation serves as a partner with local government and groups of citizens to leverage funds in order to address community problems.
Petoskey-Harbor Springs Area Community Foundation	Serving as a neutral partner, bringing diverse groups together to solve common problems - We have been bringing together several local partners around the issue of local food and farm to table initiatives. This spring we hosted a large meeting of the key stakeholders to get their input on what actions our Community Foundation could take to promote the growth of a healthy local food system.
