
What are the top 3 issues from your most recent needs assessment?



Albion Community Foundation	Albion Community School	\$31,500	This grant was for much needed playground equipment at the local elementary/middle school.

Allegan County Community Foundation	Royal Family KIDS Camp	\$2,250	Royal Family KIDS Camp was established to offer a week of camping to children in foster care. The children are celebrated, mentored, supported and cared for by an all-volunteer staff. The ratio is 1:2 so campers have a tremendous amount of support. They camp provides educational activities, fun activities, outdoor time and even a group birthday party since, sadly, most children in foster care don't get recognized on their birthday. The grant covered a variety of materials for the week.
Ann Arbor Area Community Foundation	Rotary Club of Ann Arbor	\$12,611	Universal Access Playground at Gallup Park. The playground will provide a play environment for all children, regardless of their abilities. It will also provide parents with disabilities the opportunity to comfortably take their children to a playground where they can supervise and participate safely. The playground will also encourage play and interaction among children with and without disabilities.
Barry Community Foundation	Hastings Public School	\$1,000	The Hastings Public School provides a fishing program each year where students learn many aspects about fish, environmental impact and outdoor living. The program ends with a field trip to a lake where the students learn to fish. This program is for all 5th grade students.
Battle Creek Community Foundation	Muscular Dystrophy Association	\$2,000	Grant to send Calhoun county youth to camp.
Bay Area Community Foundation	Bangor Township Schools	\$7,000	SAFE System (Security Alert For Education) works by having all teachers wear microphones on lanyards. Each classroom has speakers so students can hear their instructor from anywhere in the room. There is also a teacher-controlled 360 degree view camera. Teachers can turn the camera on to record whenever they choose, as well as schedule recording times. For safety purposes, if an issue arises in the classroom and the teacher needs to alert others, there is a button on the microphone that the teacher can press which sends an email alert to other administrators in the school. Administrators can then see live video footage of that particular classroom as well as an interactive map which shows precisely where the issue is occurring.

Branch County Community Foundation	Branch County Coalition Against Domestic Violence	\$2,500	This grant is to give girls 8-15 an opportunity to be mentored by strong women who will guide them to understand their own self-worth and become self-confident; give them strength to understand what healthy relationships can be to potentially eliminate future issues.
Cadillac Area Community Foundation	CAPS-Mackinaw Trail - 5th and 6th grade	\$870	Paid for a game called "Nine Square in the Air" which and be played inside or outside, portable, and can include numerous kids to keep them moving. Like playing volleyball above your head. the kids love the game and it gives them great exercise and team training.
Capital Region Community Foundation	Hosanna House of Michigan	\$2,500	This grant was funded to provide educational support for youth aging out of foster care in a transitional living home in Lansing. The housing and supportive services provide critical support for these young adults who suddenly find themselves alone in an adult world with no family or support system.
Charlevoix County Community Foundation	R5 Productions	\$7,500	The CCCF YAC brought in R5 Productions as a way to fulfill the needs on the most recent Youth Needs Assessment. Through proactive grantmaking, Walk a Mile was introduced to middle and high school students, parents, and faculty throughout Charlevoix County to address not only bullying and cliques, but also deeper topics such as drug and alcohol use, peer pressure and suicide. Smaller presentations of the same manner were also implemented with students in a leadership role to help change the culture at each school. The presentations were given to help everyone understand the social pressures that teens face today. Presentations took place in Boyne City, Boyne Falls, Charlevoix, East Jordan, and on Beaver Island. Following the assemblies, the estimated 2,000 students that were present showed a noticeable difference in how they interact with not only their friends and family, but with themselves.

Community Foundation For Delta County	Suicide Prevention and Support	\$2,000	This grant was to help with obtaining counseling services in the schools for students that show signs of depression and possible suicidal tendencies.
Community Foundation for Muskegon County	Muskegon Public Schools	\$5,000	The Growing Goods Project is a collaborative effort coordinated by Public Health - Muskegon County aimed at engaging youth in community gardens and civic action that translates into healthy living. The project partners community based organizations to teach life skills and community engagement that will increase the protective factors that reduce youth risk for negative health behaviors such as violence, substance abuse, and teen pregnancy. The mission of Growing Goods is to plant hope through healthy youth engagement and community collaboration. YAC grant dollars support stipends for the high school students that act as "near peer" mentors for the middle school Growing Goods participants.

It is the closest museum of its type to our county. This grant helped to support a 3rd floor expansion to allow for more exhibit space.
Community Foundation for Southeast Michigan	Give Merit, Inc.	\$8,000	Give Merit is part of a social enterprise founded by two college students. It has a for-profit clothing line from which the revenue supports the nonprofit. Through the nonprofit, Detroit youth are exposed to careers, companies (such as Google) and college fields of interest.
Community Foundation of Greater Flint	Genesee County Parks & Recreation Commission	\$650	To construct a playscape specifically designed to accommodate children with special needs as well as able bodied children. This structure will allow children of all abilities to play together simultaneously.
Community Foundation of Greater Flint	YMCA of Greater Flint - #projectTWELV E	\$500	#projectTWELVE Teen Wellness Education & Leadership Visioning Experience a Teen Development Conference offered by YMCA Camp Copneconic and Hurley Medical Center. The purpose of this program is to promote leadership skills and their connection to personal health habits by offering a multi- day retreat for Fenton teens (15-18 yrs) to educate and empower them to have a healthy mind and body.
Community Foundation of Greater Flint	Old Newsboys of Flint	\$500	The Old Newsboys plan to provide 6,000 children from low income families with basic needs items including a sweat suit, two pair of Hanes socks and underwear, a knit cap and pair of 3M Thinsulate gloves, a toothbrush, toothpaste and dental floss, and an age-appropriate toy or other gift. In 2013, the Old Newsboys of Flint were able to serve 205 Clio students in need.
Community Foundation of Greater Flint	Motherly Intercession	\$5,000	Motherly Intercession sought to expand and continue its Reading And Counting to Success (RACS) Program for the upcoming September 2015 through June 2016 school year. The

			program specifically helps to prepare the children ages of six to eighteen for keeping ahead of the curve in these ever-changing, and increasingly competitive times they provide them homework assistance that directly aligns with their school day curriculum, personalized assistance of adult tutors, and use of the STEM E-Learning computer lab. Motherly Intercession is a unique organization in that it serves children with incarcerated parents. The committee unanimously agreed that this was a population that is under served in our community.
Community Foundation of Monroe County	Boy Scouts of America	\$2,500	Hooked on Scouting creates opportunity for learning new skills, developing stronger relationships, growth in respect for the environment & earning scout achievements. It offers the chance for 250 youth and their families to get outdoors, enjoy nature and learn about fishing.
Community Foundation of St. Clair County	City of Port Huron	\$5,000	The grant was to resurface and improve a basketball court and one of the parks. The grant made an impact not only on the community around the park, but the improvements were student led. Youth from that community came together to solve the problem and presented to our YAC, it was a completely youth initiated, and youth funded project.
Community Foundation of the Holland/Zeelan d Area	Kids Food Basket	\$20,000 as part of the first year of a three year grant	This grant will help launch the Kids Food Basket Holland Sack Supper program which will initially serve two local elementary schools that have near 80% free/reduced lunch rates. They expect to be serving 600 children between these two schools by this fall.
Coopersville Area Community Foundation	North East Ottawa Forum (NEO Forum)	\$2,500	This grant was to provide students education, prevention, and treatment services to youth at risk and their families that reside within the CAPS district boundaries. This grant assisted students K-12 in a variety of ways such as poverty, drug prevention, and other ways to reach many students in the at- risk population.
Four County Community Foundation	Capac High School Senior All Night Party	\$1,000	This grant was for the Senior All Night Party the night after graduation. This grant was to help pay for supplies, gifts, and the building to rent for the students. Each year the students are thrown a party the night after graduation to celebrate their accomplishments and also to help the students stay out of trouble the night after they graduated high school. We fund this grant consecutively every year for many different schools.
Frankenmuth Community Foundation	Frankenmuth High School	\$300	Help to sponsor Homecoming Fireworks, The school cancelled the Fireworks no funding so the YAC gave \$300.00 and some of the other groups in town followed. This gave my YAC's good press time and we received more grant request in 2014-2015 than we have since we started in 2011.

Fremont Area Community Foundation	Newaygo County Regional Educational Service Agency	\$25,000	This project seeks to address the challenges related to college access and attainment; specifically, increasing post-secondary opportunities for first generation college students, and increasing parental support and involvement in order to emphasize the benefits of higher education to students. By improving post-secondary opportunities and parental involvement, schools can better assist families in the college application process. Schools plan to heighten awareness of the importance of postsecondary education through the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and The Tuition Incentive Program (TIP), College Access Initiatives, and college visits. The project will also aim at offering more support to College Ambassadors who will encourage their peers to think about their futures.
Gladwin County Community Foundation	Gladwin County District Library	\$5,000	This project provided new children's area seating and furnishings for the Beaverton Branch Library of the Gladwin County District Library. Existing furniture was for adult patrons.
Grand Haven Area Community Foundation	Grand Haven Area Public Schools	\$7,815	We awarded a grant to Grand Haven Area Public Schools to pilot a program now called Lakeshore Youth Leadership Connections. This is a program that is a partnership between the middle and high schools in Grand Haven and Muskegon. This program is aimed at cultivating leadership in students while working to expand experiences beyond their communities in order to prepare them for success beyond school. In its first year, the program worked to break down barriers and stereotypes the communities have about each other and the students realized that they are similar in many ways.

These students attend Harrison Park K-8, Westwood Middle, and Union High School.
Grand Traverse Regional Community Foundation	Traverse City Baseball Club	\$700	This grant was to support the Field of Dreams Adaptive Baseball program which gave the opportunity to youth with disabilities to practice and play baseball on a team. We provided them their very first grant which they used to leverage other funds.

YAC members brainstormed ideas for slogans, which were all taken back to the School Justice Committee for the final decision. YAC grant funds paid for the billboard.

They wanted to update their electrical system for safety and energy efficiency, and to improve lighting, to purchase a storage shed and to do Facebook promotions for their facility. The YAC granted \$2,840.00 of the \$3,640.00 requested. We did not give them money for Facebook boosts. The Family Literacy Center offers free one on one tutoring for adults and children who live or work in Lapeer County. They help students receive their GED and offer free workshops for families in our community as well as distribute more than 5,000 books to children in the community each year. We felt it was money well spent to help such a wonderful organization.
Lenawee YOUTH Council	Weekend Snack Sacks	\$2,000	Weekend Snack Sacks was started several years ago by a student in Adrian Public Schools. WSS provided brown sacks of 5 items for students who do not have enough to eat over the weekend with some food - i.e. pudding cups, fruit cups, granola bars, pop tarts, cereal bars, etc. These items are now packed by students with special needs who are over the age of 18 and enrolled in programs of the Lenawee Intermediate School District. Food is purchased often from the South Central Michigan Food Bank, for 18 cents a pound (when it is not available from the food bank, we purchase locally). WSS served 250 K-6th grade students in Adrian and Madison school districts in 2014-15 school year. They expect to serve 300 students in the next school year.

Osceola Community Foundation	Osceola Community Schools	\$10,389	We wrote one grant and then split our funds up into smaller mini grants for the 4 local schools. These have allowed the teachers to apply for these small grants in a competitive nature and to be creative with their ideas and pursue educational activities that aren't available through typical school funding. A few examples include an art class purchasing materials that involved the entire elementary school making a tile mural; a shop class making benches for students to use in the hallways; fishing supplies for a science class to study water ways and fish growth. Those were a few of the YAC's favorites.

In addition to these physical and mental health services, the center offers information for parents and guardians on nearly any topic related to adolescent health. Saginaw Community Foundation	Christian Youth Fellowship Association of Saginaw	\$3,000	The Christian Youth Fellowship Association of Saginaw (CYFAS) was founded in 2008 to provide affordable athletics to inner city youth, primarily through baseball. Since 2008, participation has gone from 120 youth to well over 350 youth through T-ball, Coach Pitch, Non-Competitive, and Competitive baseball leagues. CYFAS hopes to reach those children in the community who would otherwise not be able to participate in sports leagues due to financial restraints or transportation restraints. CYFAS has created a Training Youth Initiative (CTYI). CTYI's mission/goal is to provide a formal umpire training program to 8 teenage youth (ages 16-18) through academic tutoring and on-the-job training. With the decline in experienced umpires, training youth to become experienced umpires is a necessity for the game of baseball to survive in the area. Furthermore, it is important for the younger youth in the community to look up to the older youth and aspire to someday become a mentor and role model through the game of baseball. With rising support of baseball in our school system, an education as an umpire will not only be useful in schools but it will also create quality umpires to assist the summer baseball programs which will in turn help area youth connect with employment opportunities.

The health center links youth and their families to primary care providers in the area and supplements their care while youth are in school. Medicaid and other health insurance policies will be accepted, and services are provided at no charge, as they are based on a sliding fee scale of the youth's income. Staff can also help families enroll in Medicaid/Healthy Kids, MIChild, or the Healthy Michigan Plan. A pilot project for the "Watershed Academy" provided 100 motivated 9th and 10th grade students with the tools and knowledge to translate small-scale stewardship projects such as stream monitoring, into long-term regional stewardship and cultivate the next generation of water resource stewards. The Academy is a unique, enriching, hands-on experience focused on water conservation, protection, and restoration that complemented regular school curriculum. This is the Council's first effort in youth education and it has been a huge success! A day was scheduled for a food give away. Not only did our YAC students recommend the grant funding, they also provided sweat equity. For many of the kids, this was a huge eye-opener to the poverty in our community.

Funds from the Sturgis YAC supported the supplies needed to plant and maintain the garden this year; but additionally, YAC members spent a day in the garden alongside fourth-grade students planting the vegetables and using the time to introduce students to the concept of philanthropy.
